

## THE CHERWELL SCHOOL

## **USE OF THE PUPIL PREMIUM IN 2013/14**

The Cherwell School received £263,736 for the academic year September 2013 to August 2014. This fund was provided by the EFA (Education Funding Agency) in addition to the school's core funding and is entirely used on improving the progress of students identified as Pupil Premium students. In 2013-14 the school had 281 such students representing 21.2% of the 11-16 school roll.

# **IMPACT OF PUPIL PREMIUM GRANT 2013-2014**

## Main threshold measure (Y11 students achieving 5A\*-C English and Maths)

- PP students achieved 54% 5A\*C inc. English and Maths (compared to 43% in 2013) an increase of 11%
- A 32% increase in PP students achieving this benchmark since 2011
- Cherwell PP 17% higher than national average for PP
- Gap between Cherwell PP and Cherwell non PP has closed by 15% since 2011 (despite Cherwell Non PP also doing considerably better than National standards)



# **English and Maths Y11**

- 62% of Cherwell PP achieved A\*-C in English compared to 50% nationally. For English this is a **rise of 22% since 2011**
- 71% of Cherwell PP achieved A\*-C in Maths compared to 53% nationally. For Maths this is a **rise of 43% since 2011**

## **Expected progress Y11**

- **75**% of Cherwell PP achieved expected/ greater than expected progress in English compared to 54% nationally. For English this is a **rise of 18% since 2011**
- **80%** of Cherwell PP achieved expected/ greater than expected progress in Maths compared to 52% nationally. For Maths this is a **rise of 41% since 2011**

# **Behaviour and Attendance**

- Attendance for PP students **continues to improve** (91.9% up from 89.4% in 2011)
- Compared to national data, exclusion rates are low at The Cherwell School.
  Nationally, an average of 3.52% of students from all groups receive a fixed term
  exclusion whilst at Cherwell it is 2.3%.
- There were **no permanent exclusions** last year
- Exclusions for PP students was 5.2% representing 13 out of 250 students. This remains lower than the national average (6.8%).

#### School Life – Raising Aspirations

 Pupil Premium students have taken part in a wide range of enrichment activities funded by the Pupil Premium Grant including University visits, cultural trips to London, Visits to Germany, France and Spain to improve language skills as well as fun activities on Activity Day.

# **USE OF PUPIL PREMIUM IN 2014/15**

## Income

The school has been informed by the Education Funding Agency that it will receive £265,540 across the academic year. This funding relates to 284 pupils (21% of the school roll) in the 11-16 age range. Students are now funded at an increased £935 per pupil.

# **Expenditure**

The school allocates the income received for the benefit of Pupil premium students on roll in 2014-15 and has set out the following budget.

Cherwell has recruited Learning Mentors to work solely with Pupil Premium students. These Mentors give academic support including homework and study clubs and maintains close contact with parents and carers	
Student Inclusion Centre Provision	£ 43,049
Provides additional Teaching support and Teaching Assistant support across the curriculum both for access to lessons and for emotional and behavioural support. PP students are also offered breakfast every morning here.	
EAL (English as an Additional Language) Consultant	£ 7,802
56 different languages are spoken at The Cherwell School. Our EAL Consultant works with students and their families across the school who have English as an additional language, approximately 50% of whom are FSM (Free School Meals)/LAC (Looked After Children) students	
Curriculum Support Teacher (CST)	£ 11,453

# Next Steps 2014- 2015

- Careful and thorough analysis of successes of 2013-14, applying approaches to the current cohorts
- Continue with successful approaches from 2013-14, keeping a clear focus on individual needs of students, whilst maintaining a whole school focus on the needs of PP students
- A greater focus on Years 7 to 10, including increasing the involvement of PP students in extra-curricular activities
- Introduce Raising Achievement Plans (RAPs) for all Y11 PP students



- Better targeted English and maths interventions
- 7Stars intensive literacy group in Y7
- Continue to emphasise the importance of the role of subject teachers in knowing who their PP students are and targeting them to ensure progress; ensuring 'Quality First' Teaching
- Further improve tracking of interventions for individual students in order to measure impact more carefully
- Development of Peer mentoring
